
Today, he and his successors, would be proud of their work. To see modern technology, the new gymnasium, students receiving a Catholic education would fill them with pride.





Blessed Edmund Rice

E DMUND Rice was a successful businessman and came from a family that had a reputation for being shrewd "hardheads" in commerce.

Imbued with this family corporate culture, it is possible that the young Edmund Rice had to learn a thing or two along the way about integrity in the marketplace.

Edmund used his financial and legal skills generously and wisely to create a more just, humane and faith-filled society.


As a leader he wasn't afraid of making tough decisions for the sake of being true to his Catholic principles. He led by the example of bis life. Edmund didn't just lead people 'anywhere'; he led them to Jesus and the gospel way of life.

Nearly 200 ago, Edmund Rice started his first school in Waterford, Ireland, on a property that once belonged to his wife, who had died at childbirth. This property became known as the New Street School and it was in this former stable that Edmund Rice fitted out the upper rooms as his residence and the downstairs section as classrooms. Here, Edmund Rice warmly welcomed the young boys from the city of Waterford who were in desperate need of food, clothing and an education.

- · We respect the graced dignity of each person.



Where would we be without the Old Boys?

HE Old Boys' Association of CBC Fremantle has a long history and Br Gabriel Purton, in charge of the college's university classes from 1908, is generally regarded as the founder.

With Br Purton at the helm the Old Boys' Association grew to have its own clubrooms and 150 paid up members.

In 1927/28 the Fremantle CBC Old Boys' Cricket Club joined the Fremantle District Mercantile Association and prominent names were: Laurie Taylor, Gra. Grosvenor, Br L. 
In 1929 the Old Boys decided to fund a student scholarship, still continuing today, and added to the calendar an annual communion, a breakfast and a retreat for Old Boys.

In 1933 the Fremantle CBC Old Boys' Football Club was formed with W. Wallwork (President), H.B. Grosvenor (Secretary) and R. Shanahan (Captain-Coach). Other prominent names were: Jack Farrell, W.A. 

overlooks Fremantle Port and the harbour and from which a view of the whole town may be obtained."

On Sunday, February 3 at the invitation of the Brothers, His Lordship Bishop Matthew Gibney, third Bishop of Perth, performed the ceremony of blessing the new establishment. His Lordship expressed gratitude to the Brothers and thanked everybody for the way they had received them. He then asked the Brothers to make a special point of teaching singing so that the boys could entertain their parents and themselves at home at night "and thus create a love for home life, which was a great thing." Br Morgan then presented the Bishop with an address illuminated and framed. A portion of this said:

"...being animated by the same Spirit and having the likeend in view - the glory of God and the Christian education of youth – we hope with your Lordship's patronage and episcopal benediction, to do at least a little in the education of these youths of your Lordship's diocese."

The high school opened on Monday 4 February with 29 students. By year's end this had risen to 57. The timing was perfect because the harbour had just been completed, there was a dramatic improvement in shipping, and a railway workshop existed, employing up to 3000 men.

The numbers increased to 86 by the end of 1904. But reality hit. The railway workshops were moved to Midland, a general depression in business set in, an Anglican school was opened in High Street and school numbers began to drop. It began a roller-coaster ride that exists today with great competition for students existing amongst a range of schools, State and private.

The college site was a former quarry. Back in the early 1900's this posed plenty of problems. Enter Br Morgan. He harmoned contractions working in the area. These contings a stream


through Monument Hill suddenly found themselves delivering rubble to a college. Load after load poured in, but still the centre part, or playground, remained a very deep hole. The suggestion was to make a series of terraces, but Br Morgan had other ideas. Suddenly, rubble arrived from nearby housing estates, from the port, from all over Fremantle. Gradually the hole was filled, though the varying levels of today's grounds can be explained by this early work.

Christmas 1904 saw Br Morgan transferred to North Melbourne and Br Hanrahan became Principal. That year's annual said this of Br Morgan:

"he gained the affection and esteem of all whom he came into contact. He was very much liked by the boys and on his departure they presented him with a valuable travelling bag. Every morning and evening he was to be seen at work among his trees and flowers, and it is amazing what an amount he did for he was then a fairly old man."

One of the early students of the school was the late Sir Frederick Samson, renowned Mayor of Fremantle. A story often told by Sir Frederick recalls the occasion when he complained to this father for being "unfairly" treated. The contents of the letter he presented to Br Morgan the following day certainly highlighted the great reliance his father placed on the Brothers' integrity.

In 1912 "a well-furnished gymnasium" was erected with instruction in gymnastics and physical drill given by Lieut. Emmott. School hours were from 9am to 4pm and on Saturdays classes terminated at midday. The year book noted that young Frank Wilson won the long dive, swimming underwater for a distance of 47 yards, possibly "a school record for the State." A start was made in fitting up a physical and chemical laboratory with all the apparatus necessary for

teaching physics. It was noted that the King's Theatre was crowded for the annual display and distribution of prizes. Messrs L. Ratazzi and J. Christie were "enthusiastically encored for their really splendid rendering of 'The Irish Immigrant'." M. Hallion "appeared to advantage in the recitation 'Come Back to the Bush'."


A rapid increase in numbers in 1917 resulted in a third room being added to the high school, later to become a science room and then a gymnasium. This new building proved very comfortable and convenient, accommodating about 60 boys. Numbers in the high school had risen to 120, and in St Patrick's numbers had passed 250.

Success at the Public Service and Higher University Examinations raised the school's reputation very high, and its ex-students at university sustained the good name of the school. Br Sabas Woodlock's class was triumphant at the Public Examination in 1918 gaining the best results of all the Catholic schools in the State.


In 1920, the finances of the Brothers' school were boosted by the proceeds from a monster bazaar held in the Fremantle Town Hall. The near-week-long bazaar realised a very large sum owing to the generous support of the Catholic people from throughout the Fremantle district.

In 1931 a new agreement between the Oblate Fathers Fremantle and the Provincial of the Christian Brothers was made for the future working of "the Boys' School in that city." It transferred the school buildings and residence to the "church authorities" and allowed a payment of 300 pounds a year to the Brothers – 50 pounds for each of the six Brothers. The agreement also allowed the Brothers to hold each year, one concert, a ball, a bazaar and a fete to raise funds for the completion of the college.

In 1939, extensive landscaping of the grounds occurred as the original college building was completed.

The new building had six classrooms in two storeys, two rooms divided by a folding partition. The building was finished in rock-faced limestone with cement bands and ornamental features on the frontage, at a cost of 3143 pounds. Other alterations included removing an interior wall on the eastern side of the original building to make way for a gymnasium and general assembly area.

Enrolment reached 380 boys, the following year exceeding 400. At the opening of the extensions, Rev Fr Haugh (OMI), Parish Priest of Fremantle, announced that, under a new agreement, they now became the property of the Christian Brothers.

The highlight of 1940 was the bazaar and appeal which raised 1000 pounds. The four popular boys named that year were K. Bradley, R. Hunter, L. Downey and J. Bahen. Most money was raised from boxing tournaments, house parties, variety concerts, tennis tournaments, jumble sales, bridge parties, concerts, plays, picture benefits and children's parties.

A highlight of the 1967 Speech Night was a play put on by the boys called Treasure Island. Br Murray was congratulated for his work in helping with the props—"the stockade was his greatest masterpiece—he shut his eyes, threw on the paint and rode a bicycle over it, and we thank him for that", said a report of the event.

On November 15, 1968 the college celebrated 100 years of the Christian Brothers arrival in Melbourne. The fees for that year were: primary (\$24 a term), lower secondary (\$28 per term), fourth and fifth year (\$30 to \$32 a term) and matriculation (\$50 per term). For the first time a School Advisory Board was named "to assist in financial management

and school administration". Those accepting the role were W. J. Hughes (Jnr) (Chairman), L. Houlahan, K.P. Kelly, G. Ayres, E. Dedman, J Green, L. Hindle, G. McGowan.

With the influx of families into Fremantle in the post-war years, CBC was bulging at the seams by the early 1960's as it tried to accommodate the demand for places in its nine classrooms. Two of these rooms were annexes on the original 1882 building, and there was a small, red-brick room standingon its own by Stirling St, built 'for the Leaving boys' in the mid-fifties.

Apart from this there were only the six rooms in the original 1901 building facing Ellen St. The school grounds were simply the space between this building and the original 'hall' where 500 students were crammed into half the limited space the school now has. At recess, small boys crowded around the dirt under the courtyard trees to play marbles, and then at lunch time everybody crossed over to the park, no matter whether it was mid-summer or mid-winter. The annual arrival of a circus in Fremantle Park was always a healthy diversion, with lunch time visits to 'feed the elephants'.

Late in 1963 the six new classrooms in the block facing Ellen Street opened. A small changeroom, toilets and a canteen were included and replaced dilapidated facilities used until then. Br Nick Bilich spent many hours after school, on weekends and during his holidays refitting the downstairs rooms of the old building into two science labs separated by a 'demo room' which were in use until 1981.

Many parents and past students supported the fund raising campaign established by Br Len Marshall, as there was no source of government support for any buildings in Catholic schools in those times. Annual concerts at the Town Hall provided great entertainment for parents, while the annual


fete in the school grounds was a healthy source of fresh vegetables and home-made cakes for families. The reality was that without the additional funds raised by these events, the Brothers' community would have struggled to have had enough to live on. The days were not so distant when bags of potatoes or crates of cabbages were left on the back verandah of their residence as payment in kind for school fees. Over the years, many past students of CBC can tell of having their education provided for them at no cost as their parents could not afford to pay even the low fees.

The school was compact and cohesive. Daily assemblies after recess in the courtyard facing the stairs kept everyone in touch with the happenings of school life, as well as finding out who was in trouble on that day!

By the late sixties, opportunities for involvement in outof-school activities began to expand under the guidance of Br Peter St John. The school established a junior football club to participate in the South Fremantle junior competition. YCS was established and Mrs Olga Ellis worked with Br St John to begin the production of annual musicals and drama productions which were a highlight of the school year. The primary school began to expand to a two-stream intake, and planning commenced for building a library and a general science lab, for which Commonwealth government funds were at last being made available.

This new building, which included three new classrooms and a staffroom, was opened in 1972 and came to be dubbed 'the white building'. It was placed over the site of two of CBC's three tennis courts, parallel to High Street. The first three years of secondary school moved from preparation for the university-based Junior public examination to the new Achievement Certificate which attempted to cater for the wide



range of abilities in every classroom, and replaced the older structure of 'streaming' into those who were trades-bound and those who were university-bound. Soccer and hockey had been established but football continued to dominate the local competition in the early seventies as a number of CBC players went on to play at the top level of WAFL and VFL competition.

In 1976, CBC celebrated its 75th anniversary in a low-key way, set out to re-establish its Old Boys Association and once again faced the daunting task of forming a fund-raising committee for its next major project: the Practical Arts Building. Woodwork had been introduced as a subject by Br Peter Faulkner in 1975, when he employed former student Mr Terry Waddell to teach the subject in the basement of the 'old hall'. Terry recalls coming along to school a few days before classes began to be told his first job was to clean out the basement, build the work benches and fund-raise to buy some tools. The challenge was met. This new Practical Arts Building had rooms for woodwork, metalwork, machines and mechanics, technical drawing, craft and was opened by Kim Beazley Snr, MHR, in 1979.

During the eighties, the seeds of change which had been scattered world-wide in the sixties and seventies began to be felt in Catholic education in WA. The movement from orderrun to diocesan-based Catholic education, from regional primary education to local and parochial, from religious to lay teachers, from individual planning of the survival of each school to the comprehensive, strategic planning for the provision of Catholic education throughout the State, the planning of resources made possible through Commonwealth and State funding, the documents and principles for change from Vatican II and the loss of members of religious orders all began to reshape the world of Catholic education.

At CBC, the 'Centenary Wing' which marked the centenary of the founding of the original school on High Street in 1882 under a lay headmaster saw the building of two science labs over an undercroft linking together the two previous buildings. The current science labs and demonstration rooms were refitted for administration, and a foyer added to the Ellen Street frontage for an entry way.

Meanwhile, in the middle of 1981, the Sisters at Tuckfield Street made the sudden decision to close their school. Girls who were not able to be accommodated elsewhere came to CBC to complete the year, but did not continue beyond this. Links between the two schools were established during the seventies when some girls from this nearby school had been accessing senior science and maths classes at CBC, while boys would go there for Italian.

CBC continued unable to meet demand for enrolments, and arrangements were made to lease the Tuckfield Street site in 1982 and transfer the primary classes and Year 8 group to this site which would become the junior campus for the next 10 years, and alleviate crowding at Ellen Street.

In the nineties, CBC's old buildings were dilapidated and desperately in need of upgrading. The cost of maintaining two campuses was burdensome, and the overall appearance of the original Ellen Street campus gave the impression of a school that was 'old, tired and run-down'. Retention rates after Year 10 and 11 showed that 30% of each year group were leaving CBC to go elsewhere.

Under the leadership of Brian Lawrence, the board phased out its 110 year involvement in primary education and closed Tuckfield Street.

In 1994 upgrading of the Marshall Wing was completed and in 1995 refurbishing of classrooms above the library.

1996 became a very challenging time as the project to redevelop and refit the library and the two specialist science labs merged with the sped-up transfer of students from Tuckfield Street. The Brothers community moved out of their residence in October, and this building was then completely refitted at the end of the year to become the school's administration centre and staff work areas. The former administration became three classrooms for Year 8 and the three rooms above this were also refurbished.

1997 and 1998 involved the sale and redevelopment of the Tuckfield Street site, and work done on and around the 'old hall' at Ellen Street. By late 1999, work began on the new Physical Education Centre as well as the fenceline and landscaping project which was to be completed by September 2000. The opening of this magnificent new facility - the Bob Rose'Meyer Physical Education Centre - by Bishop Robert Healy occurred at the end of October of that year.

During 2000, the board committed itself to the 'Centenary Fund Raising Campaign' with the intention of providing funds for the upgrading of the Bill Hughes Practical Arts Centre to a Design & Technology Centre to meet the future needs of our students, and a chapel which would provide a space for and symbol of the College's spiritual foundation and aspirations. Future planning allows for the addition of two science labs above the present two, and restoration of the 'old hall' to its original design.

By 2001, the retention rate trend for students from Years 10 and 11 has been reversed from 60% to 95% at each year level. Enrolments for the intake level at Year 8 have risen steadily where the 2002 enrolment is now at capacity of 124 and a waiting list established.



Lest We Forget

HE Old Boys' Association have placed a plaque in the college grounds as a tribute to students who paid the supreme sacrifice during world conflicts.

The devastation of war hit home in the Great War of 1914-18 (of 330,000 Australian soldiers who served overseas, 60,000 did not return, 80,000 were wounded and another 90,000 were listed as sick or injured).

Old Boy, Pilot Officer William Hoey RAF during the Second World War wrote of an exercise 300 miles inside the Dutch coast. Here are some excerpts:

"We are now travelling at 12,000ft and all lights are extinguished. Everyone is now keeping a lookout for fighters and searchlights are trying to pick us out. From now on until we leave the Dutch coast on the way home I will spend five hours dodging everything in my way.

About 10 searchlights behind us are sweeping the sky. Its coming, it's got us. Now all the others are focused on us. Hundreds more are coming up from all around, and they're firing now. I must do something to get out of this.


I give orders for the under turret to be raised to give me more speed, I bring the centre under gunner to the front turret and send the wireless operator back to his wireless. I am still in these searchlights and the firing is becoming more accurate. I open the throttles to the fullest extent and push the nose down. I am travelling at about 250 miles an hour but some of the searchlights are still holding. I pull back hard on the stick and do a quick turn to the left, then to the right, push forward again and then pull back... and, at last, I'm free.

In a few minutes more I will have been over enemy territory almost an hour and have reached the most heavily defended

part; the industrial towns in the Ruhr. An intense barrage of searchlights and AA fire are being thrown up at us.

I am directly over the target and I can see the small town close by with the railway line running up to our objective. I open the bomb doors; away go four bombs. I relax and go away to turn back for another run. Once again I run on to the target and another stick of bombs are released this time aimed at the explosion and fires caused by the first bombs. I twist and come around for a third and last run. All of a sudden the aircraft gets out of control as the port wing is lifted high by a shell burst directly underneath. I manage to get control.

At 2.30 am we pass over the Dutch coast and head over the North Sea. I hand over to my second pilot. We are told to proceed to another station in south west England. I had only enough petrol to last me a little over half way. The cloud had descended right on to the ground. Suddenly I noticed ahead of me a clear patch. I made for it and when directly over it I sighted what appeared to be a flare path. I was still 5000 feet above the ground and I then lost height to about 1000 feet. You can imagine how I felt when at this height I lost sight of the flare path with the exception of one bright light at the landing end. I decided to approach this light in the direction I knew the flare path must lie as I had taken note of that from my compass. At 200 feet on a gentle power glide I passed the light about 20 feet above it, closed the throttle and held off to land. I was down."

A story of commitment

THE Hughes Family are one of the strongest supporters of Catholic education in Fremantle.

We asked Bill Hughes to reminisce, and he did.

"My father, William John Hughes, was the eldest of three brothers. He, and his siblings Cornelius and Joseph, attended Christian Brothers College in Fremantle.

In turn their sons, William Joseph and Donald Oswin Hughes (of William John), John and Peter Hughes (of Joseph) also attended CBC, as did my son Paul for a short time before going on to Aquinas. Donald Hughes joined the Oblates of Mary Immaculate and is currently Parish Priest at Fremantle.

The record of my attendance at CBC seems to have been lost at some stage but I probably joined about 1936, leaving at the end of 1941, having passed in only three subjects in the Junior examination. I was a sickly boy, often unable to complete homework or do any additional study and I claim that fact as justification for my poor scholastic results.

The strap was administered for misdemeanours and I was on the receiving end a few times, on one occasion receiving six of the best across the backside for something I had not done. My close mate, the late Dave O'Brien, admitted he was the culprit and apologised for letting me "take the rap". The incident caused great hilarity among my classmates.

I had appendicitis in my last year at school that was later thought to have been the cause of all my previous illness.

I have nothing but praise for the Christian Brothers who taught me subjects such as maths, trigonometry, science, chemistry, English and French. It left me well equipped to pursue a 40-year international career in the wool trade."



A large pictorial display tracing CBC Fremantle's history created great interest amongst the thousands of shoppers.




CENTENARY Mass to celebrate 100 years of service by the Christian Brothers to CBC Fremantle was held on 21 February 2001.



Held at the Esplanade Hotel in Fremantle the event was a resounding success. About 150 guests, a record number, enjoyed the informal nature of the Ball.


